General Meeting - April 14

7:00 pm, room 115, Science Building (Building 16) at Lane Community College, in Eugene, Oregon

This month's speaker is **John Donohue**, proprietor of Northwest Mycological Associates. John will be speaking on "Mushrooms with a Mission", about his developmental work with mushroom farming in Vietnam and Cambodia.

John Donohue has been growing mushrooms in the Pacific Northwest since 1976 and was one of the first persons ,in Oregon to produce shiitake. During his formative years with mushroom cultivation he had a 10,000 log shiitake farm in Corvallis that produced shiitake year round. At the same time he worked for many years in the wild mushroom business during the infancy of the wild mushroom harvest in the Pacific Northwest. He now works with most of the specialty mushroom farms in the Northwest and elsewhere and continues to do applied research directed toward improvement of specialty mushroom production.

Spring Foray

The CMS annual Spring Mushroom Foray is set for the weekend of May 14 in the Metolious River area. As in past years, a group of us will camp at the Jack Creek Campground. You are all welcome to join us there. We usually camp Friday and Saturday nights.

Ruminations on Mycoremediation

Coast Range Mycoremediation Project Update



In Spring 2005, CMS and several partners, embarked on a project to demonstrate the use of fungi in road reclamation. Reclaiming a road, that is, to

transform a derelict road into forest, improves salmon habitat and native plant succession. The CMS project was a "Challenge Cost Share" project of the Bureau of Land Management. CMS proposed the project in 2001, and after an involved selection process, BLM chose a site in the Coast range near Walton, with the support of the owner (David Eisler) of the adjacent land. The project site was a 1400 foot section of dirt road, level with a stream, part of a watershed supporting native salmon and steelhead populations. With donations and assistance from many including Lane Forest Products, Fungi Perfecti, and individual CMS members (especially Chris Melotti), the project began in April, 2005. We spread hog fuel and fungi inocolum (Hypholoma capnoides) over the length of the road. Then, we generally left the area alone to allow a mycelium mat to form and make the ground fluffy-conditions conducive to filtration and native plant growth. Very recently, CMS Board members Meredith Allen and Matthew Johnson and special advisor Sylvia Allen Johnson, visited the site. Although we have no hard data, the ground felt super-soft. And although the area does not look like virgin forest, there is little indication that a compacted and weedy road was once there. Native plants are growing vigorously. Based on our preliminary and non-scientific assessment, the project appears to be headed toward success. We hope to continue to keep the membership updated with official data as it comes in.
