# **Annual Spring Foray**

### Mt Pisgah Mystery Fungus

Every year we get hundreds and hundreds specimens for the show. They represent somewhere between three and four hundred species. That's why we bring in experts from all over the country to help out. Two thirds or more are fairly easy to identify, most of the rest take a little time, but we get them. And then, every year we get some that are really hard to identify. Our experts can spend many hours working to identify a single specimen. Usually, if they can get to them all, they all get identified. This year there was a particularly difficult mushroom that was never identified, until recently. But it took seven months and an international effort to get it right.

One of our expert ID'er last year, and we hope this year too, Steve Trudell, took home that unidentified mushroom and he sent us this story.

"It took an international team to figure it out, but the yellow toothy fungus from last fall's show (2011, collected at Honeyman State Park I believe) turns out to be a *Hydnellum*, despite not looking much like most of those I'm familiar with. I sent portions of the collection to Hal Burdsall in Wisconsin and Jim Ginns in BC. Neither recognized it, so Jim sent his portion of the material to Karl-Henrik Larsson in Sweden, where it was (DNA) sequenced. The folks there did not recognize it and the sequence placed it outside of the group of fungi they work with, so they forwarded the sequence to Urmas Koljalg in Estonia, who specializes in the Thelephoraceae. Apparently the sequence was a good match for Hydnellum geogenium.

I looked at the fruitbody fragments today and since it is spiny and has the typical yellow-greenish color I am pretty sure that we have found the correct identity. The name *geogenium* means "born from soil" and indicates that this species can form fruiting bodies so close to the ground that no stipe is developed.

Jim Ginns then searched for records of it and here's what he found: I did a search for *H*. *geogenium* and found only one record from the west (Redhead had it in Haida Gwaii). So you have either a very rare fungus or one that isn't so rare but doesn't draw sufficient attention to be collected often."

Thanks to Steve and thanks to the international team that made the ID possible.

### CMS Awards Scholarship

Eugene, Or. The Cascade Mycological Society Board of Directors, at their April Board meeting, awarded a \$1,000 scholarship to Alija Mujic, a PhD candidate at OSU.

Mr. Mujic is working on developing a greater understanding of the ectomycorrhizal relationship of the genera Rhizopogon and Pseudotsuga.

His research project is designed to determine the distrubution of *R*. *vinicolor* and *R*. vesiculosus (OR, WA, BC, UT, AZ, NM), investigate the population history of these two species relative to P. menziesii (Douglas-Fir), and investigate the evolutionary forces driving their speciation. This research will add to our understanding of northwest forest ecology and our baseline information about presence fungus most of us never see.

Alija anticipates final date analysis occurring in the Spring of 2013. We have invited him to speak this Fall at a general meeting about his project and his progress at that time.

Past scholarship recipients have given interesting and informative presentations on their research, I look forward hearing more on the plans and progress of this project.
